No-Bake Chocolate Crispy Cakes

You will need:

- 100g milk chocolate
- 2 tbsp golden syrup
- 50g cornflakes or rice cereal
- Cupcake cases

What to do:

1. Grown-ups gently melt the chocolate and golden syrup together.
2. Let children help stir in the cereal until it's all coated.
3. Spoon the mixture into cupcake cases.
4. Chill in the fridge until set.

This quick recipe is perfect for young children, encouraging turn-taking, counting spoonfuls, and enjoying a tasty treat together!



Montessori ideas to try at home.

Practical Life: Pouring Activity – Set up two small jugs or cups and a bowl, along with dry rice, lentils, or water. Show your child how to carefully pour from one container to another. This activity helps develop concentration, hand-eye coordination, and independence. Children love repeating it, so allow plenty of time and don't rush.

Independence: Dressing Practice - Create a small basket with everyday clothing items such as socks, hats, or zip-up jackets. Encourage your child to practise putting them on and taking them off by themselves. This builds confidence, fine motor skills, and self-care abilities while supporting independence in a calm, encouraging way.
